Carding Criteria Nominations Procedure for the 2012- 2013 Carding Cycle

1. Introduction:

Currently the maximum number of cards available to Boxing Canada's Women program is the equivalent of 6 Senior cards. But, Sport Canada is reviewing all sport carding quotas, the new quotas will be in affect for April 1, 2011. This may affect the number of cards available to Boxing's Women Team.

- Female – 6 Senior (SR1/SR2/SR/C1) Cards or equivalent. Development Card (D) may be allocated to athlete (s) meeting the development card criteria – Two (2) Senior card can equal three (3) Development Cards.

Boxing carding cycle starts on March 1st and ends on February 28.

2. Athlete eligibility requirement

To be eligible for carding the athlete must:

- Must have a valid Canadian passport on the date of the beginning of the carding cycle, and the athlete shall have been a legal resident in Canada for a minimum period of one year before being considered.
- Compete in a 2012 Olympic Games (OLY) weight division (51kg, 60kg and 75kg) and meet the International Amateur Boxing Association (AIBA) requirements to be eligible to represent Canada at major international events including World Championships and the Olympic Games.
- Be Open Class boxer who has competed in more than 10 bouts.
- Be a member in good standing of the current Senior A or B Teams.
- Commit to follow Boxing Canada's approved Training Plan & Competitions program and her coach must commit to work in consultation with Boxing Canada High Performance Director.
- Train in a registered boxing club.
- Athletes in OLY weight categories with 4 or less athletes at National Championships (NC) or Final Team Selection (FTS) will not be eligible for carding based on the results of those events.

3. Carding criteria for Female Boxers:

3.1 Senior International Card (SR1 / SR2)

Criteria:

To be eligible for a Senior International card for the 2012-2013 carding cycle, the athlete must have:

- Placed in the top 8 and top half of the field, with at least one win, in an Olympic weight category at the Worlds Senior Female Championships (*Walk-Over does not count as a win*)
- Eligible athletes who meet the international criteria may be nominated for carding for two consecutive years, with the first year referred to as SR1 and the card for the second year referred to as SR2. The second year of carding is contingent on the athlete meeting the eligibility requirements, being re-nominated by Boxing Canada and a training and competitive program approved by Boxing Canada and Sport Canada being maintained. The Athlete must also sign an Athlete Agreement and complete the Athlete Assistance Program (AAP) Application Form for the year in question.

3.2 Senior National Card (SR / C1)

Senior National Cards are intended to support athletes with the potential to reach Senior International cards status. Athletes are expected to improve each year to maintain Senior National card level.

After an athlete has been carded for four (4) consecutive years at the “Senior National Card (SR/C1)” level, Sport Canada will require a comprehensive thoroughly documented review of the Athlete’s performance over the past four years that will be conducted by the Technical Committee. In order for continue carding to be approved, the Technical Committee must demonstrated a clear progression of the athlete toward performance equivalent to top 8 and top half at the World Championships/Olympic Games. (This process must be followed for all subsequent years that the Athlete is nominated under the senior national criteria)

Athletes in OLY weight categories with 4 or less athletes at National Championships or Final Team Selection will not be eligible for carding based on the results of those events.

The remaining number of senior cards will be allocated to eligible athletes that meet the Senior National card criteria (SR/C1) in the following priority order:

Priority #1: 2012 National “A” Team Members in OLY weight categories carded in 2011-2012 carding cycle

2012 National “A” Team Members in OLY weight categories which were carded in the 2011-2012 carding cycle, which followed the National Team Program and have won a minimum of 40% of their International bouts in AIBA or CABA sanctioned competitions from the National Team Program between March 1st 2010 and February 28, 2012. Eligible athletes who meet the following standard may be nominated for a SR/C1 card as per prioritization process (section 5).

Priority #2: Previously carded National Team Members not carded in 2011-2012 cycle but competing in OLY weight categories at the 2012 Elite Canadian National Championships

Previously carded National Team Members not carded in 2011-2012 cycle but competing in OLY weight categories at the 2012 Elite Canadian National Championships, and have won a minimum of 40% of their International bouts in AIBA or CABA sanctioned competitions from the National Team Program between March 1st 2007 and February 28, 2012. Eligible athletes who meet the following standard may be nominated for a SR/C1 card as per prioritization process (section 5).

Priority #3: 2012 National “A” Team Members in OLY weight categories never carded in a previous carding cycle

2012 National “A” Team Members in OLY weight categories never carded in a previous carding cycle. Eligible athletes who meet the following standard may be nominated for a SR/C1 card as per prioritization process (section 5).

Priority #4: 2012 National “A” Team Members in OLY weight categories in weight categories with 4 or less entries at National Championships or Final Team Selection

2012 National “A” Team Members in OLY weight categories in weight categories with 4 or less entries National Championships or Final Team Selection who won a minimum of 40% of their International bouts (Must have participated in a minimum of 3 bouts) in AIBA or CABA sanctioned competitions, between March 1st 2010 and February 28, 2012. Eligible athletes who meet the following standard may be nominated for a SR/C1 card as per prioritization process (section 5).

Priority #5: 2012 National “B” Team Members in OLY weight categories carded in 2011-2012 carding cycle

2012 National “B” Team Members in OLY weight categories which were carded in the 2011-2012 carding cycle, which followed the National Team Program and have won a minimum of 40% of their International bouts (Must have participated in a minimum of 3 bouts) in AIBA or CABA sanctioned competitions from the National Team Program between March 1st 2010 and February 28, 2012. Eligible athletes who meet the following standard may be nominated for a SR/C1 card as per prioritization process (section 5).

3.3 Development Card (D)

Eligible athletes who meet the following standard may be nominated for a D card as per prioritization process (section 5):

An athlete may be eligible for D card for a maximum of 2 years.

Priority #1: 2012 National “B” Team Members in OLY weight categories never carded in a previous carding cycle

2012 National “B” Team Members in OLY weight categories never carded in a previous carding cycle, which followed the National Team Program and have won a minimum of 40% of their International bouts (Must have participated in a minimum of 3 bouts) in AIBA or CABA sanctioned competitions between March 1st 2010 and February 28, 2012. Eligible athletes who meet the following standard may be nominated for a SR/C1 card as per prioritization process (section 5).

4. Injury Card

No Illness, Injury or Pregnancy Card will be allocated.

5. Prioritization Process

Eligible athletes will be nominated for AAP support in the following priority order:

Female
a) Athletes who meet the SR1/SR2 criteria;
b) Athletes who meet the SR/C1 Priority #1 criteria;
c) Athletes who meet the SR/C1 Priority #2 criteria;
d) Athletes who meet the SR/C1 Priority #3 criteria;
e) Athletes who meet the SR/C1 Priority #4 criteria;
f) Athletes who meet the SR/C1 Priority #5 criteria;
f) Athletes who meet the D Priority #1 criteria.

5.1 Senior (SR1, SR2, SR & C1) & Development Priority #1 carding criteria prioritization:

- a) If there are fewer cards than athletes meeting one of the above carding criteria, the athlete with the highest number of points, from the National Point System, between March 1st 2010 and February 28, 2012, with Boxing Canada’s official National Senior Team Program, will be ranked higher.
- b) If there are two or more athletes with the same number of points, the athlete with the highest number of domestic points from the National Point System, between March 1st 2010 and February 28, 2012, will be ranked higher.
- c) If there are two or more athletes with the same number of points, the athlete with the best win/loss ratio of bouts in the last three years, will be ranked higher

- d) All unresolved ties will be settled by the Technical Committee based on their expert evaluation of the athlete's potential, in order to identify the athlete ranking.

6. Nomination List

The athlete carding nomination list will be circulated to the athletes and coaches on or before March 1st. Upon circulation date, athletes and/or coaches have 5 days to notify CABA if there have been any errors or omissions in the nomination process.

7. Appeal

For any matters related to the Athlete Assistance Program Nomination or de-carding, all appeals must follow the Policies and Procedures of Sport Canada's Athlete Assistance Program (AAP) Section 13 <http://www.pch.gc.ca/pgm/sc/pol/athl/114-eng.cfm>

Annex 1

*Internal nomination procedures
National Elite Team Selection Process*

Introduction:

To be eligible for the National Elite Team, the athlete must have a valid **Canadian Passport** on the date of the beginning of the new Team Selection year, and the athlete shall have been a legal resident in Canada for a minimum period of one year before being considered.

Athletes must meet the International Amateur Boxing Association (AIBA) requirements to be eligible to represent Canada at major international events including World Championships and the Olympic Games.

Athletes with dual citizenships who represented another country at the following competitions: Olympic Games, World Championships, Pan-American Games, Francophone Games or the Commonwealth Games within the 3 previous years are not eligible.

Stage 1:

2012 Elite Canadian National Championships – January 10 – 14, 2012

Eligible athletes in each weight category are:

1. One (1) Athlete per weight division per province / territories
 2. 2011 Carded Athletes
 3. 2011 National A Team athletes not carded
 4. 2011 National B Team athletes not carded
 5. 2011 National Champions who were not Carded
- The remaining position will be allocated to Provinces/Territories who have requested sending extra boxers: **A maximum of three (3) extra boxers per weight division per Provinces/Territories**

Note:

- Maximum number of entries is 16 per weight category. Additional entries over sixteen (16) will be done by a draw at Boxing Canada (CABA) office in Ottawa by staff 10 days (working days) prior to the 2012 Elite Canadian National Championships.
- To have their eligibility to participate at the 2012 Elite Canadian National Championships without qualifying in their Province those athletes (2, 3, 4 and 5) need to register in the weight categories which they have competed at the 2011 Elite Canadian National Championships.
- Athletes that Qualified for the 2012 Olympic Games at the 2011 AIBA Men's World Championships are exempt from the 2012 Elite Canadian National Championships.

Registration:

- Registration will be open from December 05, 2011 to December 26, 2011.
- Official Registration document must be completed and received in the Boxing Canada office by this time. NO EXCEPTIONS.
- No substitute changes among the athlete's will be allowed after the registration deadline (December 26, 2011).
- No weight categories changes among the athlete's will be allowed 10 days before the National Championships.
- Elite Athlete: \$10
- Provincial Coach and Team Manager: \$10
- Fee of \$50 per athletes for no show after the registration deadline (December 26, 2011).

Note:

- Coaches will be able to purchase a \$30 weekly pass to assist and coach at the 2012 Elite Canadian National Championships. Boxing Canada coaching card will be required.

Competitor Eligibility:

- Athletes born in 1993 or prior.
- Athletes **MUST** be Elite open class boxers.
- All participants must be a member of a Boxing Canada Member Association.

Documentation:

- To participate at this event as an athlete you **MUST** have a boxing passport with a photo and current registration year.
- To participate at this event as an athlete the Annual medical **MUST** be done in your boxing book.
- To participate at this event as a coach you **MUST** have your Boxing Coach coaching card.

★ **These three (3) rules will be enforced.**

Draws:

- Elite draw will be seeded as: The National 2011 “A” Team Members will get the number 1 spot and the 2011 National “B” Team Members will get the number 2 spot provided they are competing in the same weight division as 2011 Elite Canadian National Championships.

Competition Format:

- New AIBA Swiss scoring system will be used for this tournament.
- Single elimination.

Weight Classes:

- Elite Men's: 49kg, 52kg, 56kg, 60kg, 64kg, 69kg, 75kg, 81kg, 91kg and +91kg
- Elite Women's: 48kg, 51kg, 54kg, 57kg, 60kg, 64kg, 69kg, 75kg, 81kg and +81kg

Weigh In:

- Test scale will be available everyday 1 hour prior to scheduled official weigh-in.
- Registered boxer's weight should not exceed the maximum of the boxer's weight class nor be below the minimum of the boxer's weight class.
- The weight registered at the general weigh-in on the first day decides the boxer's weight class for the entire competition, but this boxer will still be required to weigh-in each day in which this boxer is due to box to ensure that the actual weight on that day does not exceed the maximum of the boxer's registered weight class.
- Any competitor who cannot make the weight at the general weigh-in can enter the higher or lower weight class if numbers permit.

Equipment:

- New AIBA Swiss scoring system will be used for this tournament.
- AIBA approved Competition gloves will be provided by Boxing Canada.
- AIBA approved Competition head gear (red and blue) will be provided by Boxing Canada
- Bandages (handwraps) will be provided to all boxers by Boxing Canada.
- All uniforms used by athletes MUST be a majority colour RED or BLUE for respective corners.
- The mouth guard is mandatory and No Red mouth guard or similar color will be permitted.
- Uniform that denote Canada are not allowed.
- Athletes with long hair MUST wear a bandana or a hair net under their headgear.

Note:

- No personal boxing gloves, bandages (handwraps) and head gear will be permitted in the ring.
- Adidas, Everlast and Top Ten are the only AIBA approved supplier.

Inspection:

- Athletes MUST pass bandage inspection before each match. Inspection will be done at the gloving table.
- Athletes will NOT be audibly called for inspection and gloved up.
- Coaches MUST have their boxers inspected and gloved up at least 15 minutes prior to bout time.

Protest:

- A complete protest MUST be prepared by the Provincial Coach or Team Manager and submitted to the Technical Delegate within 30 Minutes of the end of the match, with a protest fee of \$100 in cash or money order.

Doping Control:

- Doping control testing may be conducted, in accordance with the Canadian Policy on Doping in Sport and Canadian Doping Control Regulations. Please see <http://www.cces.ca>.

2012 Elite Final Team Selection Procedures:

- If the 2011 National “A” Team member wins Gold in his/her weight division at the 2012 Elite Canadian National Championships he/she will automatically remain National “A” Team member, and need not attend the 2012 Final Team Selection.
 - However an FTS tournament will be required in this weight division to determine who will be on National “B” Team (*the first alternate*) in that weight division.
- If the 2011 National “A” Team member does not win Gold at the 2012 Elite Canadian National Championships he/she will automatically be invited to the 2012 FTS.
- If the 2011 National “A” Team member cannot participate in the 2012 Elite Canadian National Championships because of an injury, he/she will be invited to participate at the 2012 FTS. (Medical paper needed)
- If an Athlete cannot participate at the 2012 Final Team Selection for whatever reason there will be no additional Box-Off.

Eligible athletes in each weight category are:

- 2012 Elite Canadian National Champion (Gold Medal) – seed 1
- 2012 Elite Canadian National runner up (Silver Medal) – seed 2
- Seed 3, 4, 5 & 6 if applicable
 - Seed 3, 4, 5 & 6 selected by the High Performance Director (Selection based on criteria explained in Annex A below)

Note:

- If the current Elite Canadian National Champion and/or the Silver Medalist are not competing at the 2012 FTS, the High Performance Director may select another boxer in accordance with the selection criteria explained in Annex A below.
- Athletes that Qualified for the 2012 Olympic Games at the 2011 AIBA Men’s World championships are exempt from the 2012 Final Team Selection.

2012 Elite Final Team Selection Procedure:

In the event of:

- Two (2) boxers only in the category seed 1 (2012 Elite Canadian National Champion) must be defeated twice.
- Three (3) boxers in the category seed 1 (2012 Elite Canadian National Champion) receives a bye and must be defeated twice.
- Four (4) boxers in the category seed 1 (2012 Elite Canadian National Champion) picks his/her opponent between Seed 2, 3 and 4. If seed 1 should lose in his/her 1st bout, he/she is eliminated from the tournament.
 - Subsequently, should seed 1 reach the final he/she must be defeated twice.
- Five (5) boxers in the category seed 1 (2012 Elite Canadian National Champion) gets the bye and pick his/her opponent between Seed 2, 3, 4 and 5. If seed 1 should lose in his/her 1st bout, he/she is eliminated from the tournament.
 - Subsequently should seed 1 reach the final he/she must be defeated twice.
 - All remaining seeds are then matched through an open draw.
- Six (6) boxers in the category seed 1 (2012 Elite Canadian National Champion) gets the bye and pick his/her opponent between Seed 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6. If seed 1 should lose in his/her 1st bout, he/she is eliminated from the tournament.
 - Subsequently should seed 1 reach the final he/she must be defeated twice.
 - All remaining seed are then matched through an open draw.

Note:

- The Winner of the FTS becomes the National Team Member.
- If seed 1 (2012 Elite Canadian National Champion) does not attend the Final Team Selection (FTS), there will be an open draw and the winner of the FTS will be the new National “A” Team Member.
- In the event the reigning champion member repeats as 2012 Elite Canadian National Champion, there will be no FTS in that weight class. However, an open draw will take place with all attending seeds for the National “B” Team position (first alternate) in that weight division.

- No personal boxing gloves, Bandages (handwraps) and head gear will be permitted in the ring.
- Adidas, Everlast and Top Ten are the only AIBA approved supplier.

Inspection:

- Athletes MUST pass bandage inspection before each match. Inspection will be done at the gloving table.
- Athletes will NOT be audibly called for inspection and gloved up.
- Coaches MUST have their boxers inspected and gloved up at least 15 minutes prior to bout time.

Protest:

- A complete protest MUST be prepared by the Provincial Coach or Team Manager and submitted to the Technical Delegate within 30 Minutes of the end of the match, with a protest fee of \$100 in cash or money order.

Doping Control:

- Doping control testing may be conducted, in accordance with the Canadian Policy on Doping in Sport and Canadian Doping Control Regulations. Please see <http://www.cces.ca>.

SEEDS 3, 4, 5 and 6 WILL BE SELECTED BASED ON THE FOLLOWING CRITERIA:

- a) Wins on the National Team
- b) Years on National Team
- c) Performance at 2011 Canadian Championships
- d) Performance at past Canadian Championships
- e) Past National Team Results

Note:

- In the event of unforeseen or unusual circumstances, as determined by the office of the High Performance Director. The office of the High Performance Director shall have full discretion to resolve the matter as it sees fit taking into account factors and circumstances that it deems relevant. Any such exercise of discretion shall be subject to the Canadian administrative law and principles of fairness.

APPEAL PROCESS FOR SEED:

The selection decision for seed may be appealed in accordance with CABA's Appeal Policy. (Annex 3 of the document Carding Criteria Nomination Procedure for the 2012-2013 Carding Cycle)

APPEAL OF THE NATIONAL BOUTS RESULTS:

As the athletes are selected through performance in the ring only, an appeal of a decision becomes an appeal of the performance result decision, called "protest" as per CABA Rules.

1. If a boxer (coach, team manager) feels that the performance result decision was wrong, the team manager or coach has to submit a written protest to the (neutral) Jury at ringside within one hour of the bout.
2. The Jury will review the decision, usually with aid of video viewing, immediately after the competition, and notify the person who submitted the protest of its verdict.
3. Boxing Canada's Executive Committee will resolve any extraordinary cases

APPEALS POLICY

Purpose:

1. The purpose of this policy is to enable disputes between individuals and the Canadian Amateur Boxing Association (CABA) to be dealt with fairly, expeditiously and affordably, without recourse to formal legal and court-like procedures.

Application:

2. This policy applies to all members of CABA including athletes, coaches, officials, organizers, volunteers, employees and directors. It applies to decisions made by the Board of Directors of CABA, by any CABA Committee, by any CABA Discipline Committee or by any body or individual who has been delegated authority to make decisions on behalf of CABA. Any member who is affected by such a decision may appeal the decision, provided there are sufficient grounds for the appeal as defined in this policy.
3. This policy does not apply to:
 - a. Matters of employment;
 - b. Matters that are within the jurisdiction of a provincial association or AIBA;
 - c. Matters relating to the Canadian Policy on Doping in Sport and the Canadian Doping Control Regulations;
 - d. The rules of the Canadian Amateur Boxing Association.
4. Notwithstanding paragraph 2. above, for any matters related to the Athlete Assistance Program Nomination or de-carding, all appeals must follow the Policies and Procedures of Sport Canada's Athlete Assistance Program (AAP) Section 13.1

Timing of appeal:

5. Any member who wishes to appeal a decision will have 10 days from the date on which they received notice of the decision, to submit written notice of their intention to appeal, along with detailed reasons for the appeal, to the President of CABA.
6. Anyone member wishing to initiate an appeal beyond 10-day period must provide a written request stating reasons for an exemption to the requirement of Section 4 the decision to allow, or not allow an appeal outside the 10 day period will be at the sole discretion of the President.

Grounds of appeal:

7. A decision cannot be appealed nor can an appeal be heard, on the merits of the decision. Decisions may only be appealed and appeals may only be heard, on procedural grounds. Procedural grounds are limited to CABA:
 - a. Making a decision for which it did not have the authority or jurisdiction as set out in CABA's governing documents;
 - b. Failing to follow procedures as laid out in the bylaws or approved policies of CABA;
 - c. Misinterpreting a rule of CABA;
 - d. Making a decision which was influenced by bias.

Screening of appeal:

8. Within 3 days of receiving the notice of appeal, the President will decide whether or not the appeal is based on one or more of the grounds described in Section 6.
9. If the appeal is denied on the basis of insufficient grounds, the member will be notified of this decision in writing, giving reasons. This decision is at the sole discretion of the President and may not be appealed.

Appeals panel:

10. If the President is satisfied that there are sufficient grounds for an appeal, within 10 days of having received the original notice of appeal the President will appoint three unbiased individuals to serve as an Appeals Panel, one whom will serve as Chairman.

Preliminary Conference:

11. The Panel may determine that the circumstances of the dispute warrant a preliminary conference. The matters that may be considered at a preliminary conference include:
 - a. Format for the appeal (hearing by documentary evidence, oral hearing in-person, oral hearing by telephone conference, or a combination of these methods);
 - b. Date and location of hearing;
 - c. Timelines for exchange of documents;
 - d. Clarification of issues in dispute;
 - e. Clarification of evidence to be presented to the Panel;
 - f. Order and procedure of hearing;
 - g. Remedies being sought;
 - h. Identification of witness;
 - i. Any other matter that may assist in expediting the appeal proceedings.

12. The panel may delegate to its Chairperson or to one of its members the authority to deal with these preliminary matters.

Procedure for the appeal:

13. Where the Panel has determined that the appeal will be held by way of oral hearing, the Panel will govern the hearing by such procedures as it deems appropriate in the circumstances, provided that:
- a. The hearing will be held within 21 days of the Panel's appointment.
 - b. A quorum will be all three Panel members.
 - c. Decisions will be by majority vote, where the Chairperson carries a vote.
 - d. If the decision of the Panel may affect another party to the extent that the other party could have recourse to an appeal under this policy, that party will become a party to the appeal in question.
 - e. The appellant, respondent and any affected parties will be given 10 days written notice of the date, time and place of the appeal hearing.
 - f. The panel may direct that any other individual participate in the appeal.
 - g. In the event that one of the Panel's members is unable or unwilling to continue with the appeal, the matter will be concluded by the remaining two Panel members who will make their decision unanimously.
 - h. Unless otherwise agreed by the parties, there will be no communication between Panel members and the parties except in the presence of, or by copy to, the other parties.

Procedure for a documentary hearing;

14. Where the Panel has determined that the appeal will be held by way of documentary evidence, it will govern the appeal by such procedures as it deems appropriate in the circumstances provided that:
- a. All parties are given an opportunity to provide written submissions to the Panel, to review written submissions of the other parties, and to provide written rebuttal.
 - b. The applicable principles and timelines of Section 12 are respected.
 - c.

Evidence that may be considered:

15. As a general rule, the Panel will only consider that evidence that was before the original decision-maker. At its discretion the Panel may hear new evidence that is material and that was not available at the time of the original decision.

Appeal decision:

16. Within 5 days of concluding the appeal, the Panel will issue its written decision, with reasons. In making its decision, the Panel will have no greater authority than that of the original decision-maker. The Panel may decide:
- a. To void or confirm the decision being appealed;
 - b. To vary the decision where it is found that an error occurred and such an error cannot be corrected by the original decision-maker for reasons which include, but are not limited to, lack of clear procedure, lack of time or lack of neutrality;
 - c. To refer the matter back to the initial decision-maker for a new decision;
 - d. To determine how cost of the appeal will be allocated, if at all.
17. A copy of this decision will be provided to each of the parties and to the President and Executive Director.

Timelines:

18. If the circumstances of the dispute are such that this policy will not allow a timely appeal, the Panel may direct that these timelines be abridged. If the circumstances of the dispute are such the appeal cannot be concluded within the timelines dictated in this policy, the panel may direct that these timelines be extended.
19. Where there is a need to render a decision quickly, the Panel may issue a summary decision with reasons to follow, provided the written decision, with reasons, is rendered within 5 days of concluding the appeal or such other timeline as may be agreed to by the parties.

Jurisdiction:

20. The decision of the Panel will be final and binding upon the appellant, respondent and CABA.
21. There is no further internal appeal procedure within CABA. Once all aspects of the Canadian Amateur Boxing Association internal appeal procedure are exhausted, any further Action on the issue must forwarded directly to the Federal Government sponsored Sport Dispute Resolution Centre of Canada (CRDSC-SDRCCC) mechanism.
22. No action or legal proceeding will be commenced against CABA in respect of a dispute, unless CABA has refused or failed to abide by the provisions for appeal of the dispute, as set out in this policy.
